

4-H VEGETABLE

ELIGIBILITY

- Open to 4-H members carrying County-wide Vegetable Gardening projects. Each exhibitor ages 8-18 years old can enter up to 10 entries. Must have project books complete and entered.
- Exhibitors must exhibit the exact number of specimens or plants listed after each vegetable below. No exhibitor may have more than one entry in each class. Example: You can not have 2 bell peppers like Bell Boy and Big Bertha, but you can have 1 entry of green bell and one of hot pepper.
- Individual classes (i.e. green beans) will be judged on the Danish system. The Danish system allows a judge to give a blue ribbon to all exhibits he/she feels are deserving. The Grand Champion Vegetable Ribbon will go to the member with the four (4) best classes exhibited in the vegetable category.
- When picking your vegetables for Fair, pick marketable vegetables. This means choose the vegetables that would bring the highest market price (DO NOT CHOOSE THE LARGEST). Select medium sized specimens. Remember to keep them uniform in size, color, and variety. Try to make sure they are blemish free and are prime—not too young or old. Potatoes should not be washed, just wiped off with a soft cloth.
- Tomatoes should have stems removed. Beats and carrots should have tops trimmed 2 inches. Remember to exhibit the exact number of specimens called for.

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| 4-H FLOWER |
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ELIGIBILITY

- All ages 8-18 may bring up to 10 entries. Each 4-H member must have a project book completed and entered. Please try to include a picture of your flower beds in the back of your book. No exhibitor may have more than one entry per class. This means if you plant 3 different kinds of Marigolds you may only show 1 kind; therefore, pick your best one.
- Exhibits must be cut flowers grown by the exhibitor. You will need 6 blooms if the bloom size is 2 inches or less, 3 blooms if the bloom is over 2 inches, and anything over 4 inches you will need only 1 bloom.
- Individual classes will be judged on the Danish system,. This allows a judge to give a blue ribbon to all exhibits he/she feels are deserving. The Grand Champion Ribbon will go to the member with the 4 best classes exhibited in flowers.
- When selecting flowers for the fair, look for uniformity. Choose flowers that are the same color, size, and make them the same height. Also try to select flowers that are at their prime—this is right after they open fully when they have the best color with no petals missing. Make certain that your flowers do not have blemishes and do not look old and faded. Make certain that they are all the same variety. These are things that the judges look for. You may display your flowers in any little container (baby food jars, jam jars, medicine bottles, etc.) The container is not going to be judged.

ALL ANIMALS FOR PET CARE must be kept under control (leashes, cages, carriers, etc.). These animals do not stay at the Fair. Bring animals for Pet Care judging only. You may display a poster in the green building with your project book during Fair week.

4-H WILDLIFE

ELIGIBILITY

Open to all 4-H members carrying 4-H Wildlife Project. A member enrolled in the 4-H Wildlife project is limited one of the classes listed below.

FFA GENERAL RULES:

1. The Mifflin County Youth Fair Board, the Big Valley FFA., and the Mifflin County FFA Association are not responsible for accidents, loss, or damage by water, fire, theft, or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of any damage or loss of items exhibited.
2. Reasonable care in protection will be provided , however, the police are on duty in the main exhibit building from 11:00 PM to 7:00 AM.
3. The decision of the judges shall be final in all cases, except where mistakes, fraud, or misrepresentation are discovered.
4. The EXHIBITOR is responsible to make it known to the fair personnel the proper name of the article or breed of livestock they are entering. Every exhibit must be given an entry tag showing: the name of exhibitor, chapter, breed, and class.
5. An exhibitor shall not receive more than one premium in any department, class, or subdivision of a class except as provided for by the specific rules of a department, class ,or subdivision of a class.
6. Exhibitors are required to give personal attention to their exhibits, and they are also responsible for removing exhibits after the close of the event.

FFA EXHIBITION HALL CLASSES

Class 1 Corn: Exhibit shall be 3 stalks-one with the roots attached (roots should be washed clean of dirt with a hose).

Class 2 Com: Exhibit shall consist of 6 uniform dry ears selected from 1 variety of last year 's com.

GRAIN: Two quarts are necessary for the exhibit. Be sure grain is clean, dry, and FREE FROM FOREIGN MATTER.

Classes: Barley, Wheat, Buckwheat, Oats, Soybeans, Spelt, Rye, Sunflower.

HAY: Long hay only (an exhibit shall consist of a bale section approximately 8" thick).

Classes:

- a. Alfalfa or Alfalfa Grass Mixed **first** cutting-not more than 50% grass
- b. Alfalfa or Alfalfa Grass Mixed-later cuttings-not more than 50% grass
- c. Other Legumes or Legume Grass Mix--not more than 50% grass
- d. Grass-first cutting-mixtures of timothy and/or other grasses and containing not more than 10% legumes
- e. Grass-later cuttings-mixture of timothy and/or other grasses and containing not more than 10% legumes
- f. Summer annual grasses - sudan grass, sorghum/sudan, hybrid s, etc.

SILAGE: Crops must be named. Exhibits shall consist of ten pounds (large size plastic bags are excellent containers for transporting or showing samples.)

1. Perennial crops - direct cut, with or without preservatives.
2. Perennial crops -wilted or low moisture , with or without preservatives.
3. Annuals other than corn - direct cut, with or without preservatives.
4. Annuals other than com -wilted or low moisture, with or without preservatives.
5. Corn silage

VEGETABLES: In selecting vegetables for exhibition, choose such specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest—select medium size specimens. If at all possible, do not mix varieties.

The following factors are generally used by an expert vegetable judge:

- a. Trueness to variety type. If at all possible, pick the specimens from one variety.
- b. Uniformity in shape, size and color.
- c. Be sure to pick out a perfect specimen, then select the other as similar to it as possible.
- d. Protect from dirt, disease, infection, and mechanical damage. Select specimens that are perfect and show no blemishes of any kind.
- e. Condition and maturity. Be sure that exhibits are of high quality.
- f. Potatoes should not be washed. Remove soil using a soft cloth or brush.
- g. Tomatoes should have stems removed. Carrots, beets, etc., should have tops removed from them leaving about two inches of stem.

Read premium material, carefully following all rules and regulations. If an entry calls for five specimens, be sure to exhibit that number—do not enter four or six. In any instance, your exhibits will be disqualified if the correct number of specimens are not entered.
